Research question

- Do people support traditional/new models of democracy?
 - Direct Democracy: The government should seek the opinion of its population much more often.
 - Technocracy: We should leave the important decisions to the experts.
 - Deliberative Democracy: Male and female politicians must often make decisions based on discussions among citizens.
 - Representative Democracy: Since politicians are the ones responsible they have to make the decisions themselves.
 - "Business" democracy: The government would work better if decisions were made by people who have succeeded in business.

Who and why?

- Participatory orientation:
 - Feeling of external political efficacy is negatively correlated
 - Lower level of education
 - Same goes for political interest
 - Social categories who are the most critical of the effectiveness of the representative government
- Delegative orientation:
 - Age: positive effect
 - Lower level of education
 - Political interest and the feeling of external political efficacy are negatively correlated

Complex democratic preferences

- The most disadvantaged social categories and those who believe little in the effectiveness of the current system tend to desire a change of democratic model, regardless of its form
 - The delegative model is supported by people who have more confidence in the traditional political actors
- More of a rejection of the current situation than the specific desire of another political model – see Webb (2013)
- Lack of a consensus
